The law provided for the creation of a special Holocaust fund to be managed by the Macedonian Jews, the Jewish Holocaust Fund, from heirless Jewish properties. The fund was subsequently established in April 2002. The Holocaust Memorial Center for the Jews of Macedonia was opened in Skopje in 2011.</p> <p>Macedonia is also one of the few countries that has completed its restitution process.</p> <p>Please also note that some Judaica was given to the Jewish Museum in Belgrade, Serbia, and that research on what Judaica may have been removed to Bulgaria remains to be done.</p>
